### Ingeniørgrotta 2007

#### Ingeniørgrotta 2007

What was later named "Ingeniørgrotta" in Bonådalen in Nordland, the Northern part of Norway, was discovered in 1996 by Pål Henrik Gulbrandsen, and temporarily explored by Iain Schrøder and Jan Erik Johansen, who also gave it its name. In the years 1997-2007, except 1999, annual expeditions with various participants - whom are only mentioned by their first names - have explored the Ingeniørgrotta and other caves connected with it. The entrance is in the wall some metres above the bottom of a 25 metres deep sink, some 440 m.a.s.l., leading through narrow and muddy crawls to a series of pits. The system is far from fully explored, and many side passages and possible connections from the surface remain.
